1960

In 1960, two men wanted to be the next president of the United States. One was John F. Kennedy, a senator from Massachusetts. The other was Richard Nixon, the vice president at the time.

John Kennedy was different from most presidents. He was Catholic, and there had never been a Catholic president before. Some people worried about that. He was also very young. He was only 43 years old. Other presidents had usually been much older.

But Kennedy was good at talking to people. He gave speeches that made people excited about America. He also did something brand new: he debated Richard Nixon on television. About 70 million people watched the first debate. People who listened on the radio thought Nixon won. People who watched on television thought Kennedy won. Kennedy looked young and confident; Nixon looked tired and sweaty.

When the votes were counted, Kennedy won. But he won by a tiny number of votes - one of the closest elections in American history. He became the youngest person ever elected president and the first Catholic president.

John F. Kennedy became the 35th president. He started his job in January 1961.

Kennedy defeated Richard Nixon in a very close election. He was 43 years old when he took office, the youngest person ever elected.

2.

Accept any of: (1) It was the first time presidential candidates debated on TV. (2) The first Catholic was elected president. (3) The youngest person ever elected president won. (4) It was one of the closest elections in U.S. history. Award credit for any specific difference.
